MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Asparagus supplies from Mexico and Peru remain limited on larger sizes. Small and Standard sizes will dominate, with larger sizes seeing stronger markets and smaller sizes rising slightly on demand.

Bell Peppers: Markets stay steady at high levels. Limited East Coast supply shifts demand to California, where prices rise as new fields come in. Quality is strong. Red bells remain tight, with limited supply expected for two weeks.

Blackberries: Product remains very tight due to cooler temperatures and reduced Mexican crossings, resulting in a market where demand continues to exceed supply.

Brussel Sprouts: Sprout supplies remain very tight with high prices as demand exceeds supply. Oxnard production is nearly done. Quality issues include elongated cores, insect damage, and some discoloration.

Lemons: Markets remain strong. District 1 is finished; District 2 is now the main region. Sizes 165ct and smaller are very limited. Choice grade dominates, with less Fancy available. Offshore fruit delayed until late July/early August; Mexico ramps up next week.

Pineapple: Costa Rican pineapples face high demand and limited crownless supply. Longer flowering and heavy storms are delaying harvests.

CROP UPDATES

Tropical activity is calm, with a low-pressure system near Florida next week. A heat dome brings warm temps to the Mississippi Valley and Northeast. Central Mexico gets less rain, NW Mexico stays in drought. Cool, cloudy weather slows growth in Coastal California, with pest issues hitting broccoli and brussels sprouts. Supplies remain tight, especially for brussels sprouts. Weather will impact future supply. <u>Read more</u>

WEATHER

California: Cooler temps and spotty drizzle persist through the week due to weak high pressure and a marine layer. Morning lows in the mid-40s to mid-50s; highs range from low 60s on the coast to upper 80s south of Soledad. Warming returns Sunday with highs reaching mid-80s to mid-90s inland.

Mexico: Isolated showers will increase across the region by the weekend, with 0.05" to 0.20" of rain and higher amounts in storms. Temps will be in the low 70s to low 80s, with lows in the mid-50s to mid-60s. Florida: Scattered showers and storms are expected Wednesday-Thursday, with 0.15"–0.35" of rain and higher amounts near Big Bend. Temps stay warm—highs in the upper 80s to mid-90s, lows in the 70s. Winds gust near 20 mph through Friday.

Arizona: A stalled low off the West Coast is keeping low desert temps below normal through Friday. Warming returns this weekend, with highs rising from upper 90s–105°F to 105–110°F by Sunday. Lows remain in the low to mid-70s.

Markets on 48ct fruit remain slightly stronger, while 60ct and 70ct sizes continue to perform well as we transition from the Normal crop to the Flora Loca crop. Shippers are managing a mix of both crops and working carefully to keep them separate in cartons to avoid checkerboarding. The new crop is expected to peak on 48/60ct sizes, with very clean fruit and minimal #2 grade—typical for this time of year. The California season is gradually winding down and is expected to finish in about a month. Offshore arrivals continue on both coasts.

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Weather Apdates

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CALIFORNIA

Weak high pressure and a deep marine layer will keep temperatures below average with spotty drizzle through the end of the week. Morning lows will range from the mid-40s to mid-50s, with daytime highs in the low to mid-60s along the coast, low to upper 70s in the coastal valleys, and upper 70s to upper 80s south of Soledad. By Sunday, a strengthening high will weaken the marine layer, warming inland temperatures to the mid-80s to mid-90s.



MEXICO

Isolated showers will occur, with chances spreading across most of the region by the weekend. Rainfall totals will generally range from 0.05" to 0.20", with higher amounts possible in thunderstorms. Maximum temperatures will mostly be in the low 70s to low 80s through the weekend, with lows in the mid-50s to mid-60s through Sunday morning.



FLORIDA

Scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected Wednesday into Thursday as a low-pressure system brings moisture to the area. Rainfall totals will generally range from 0.15" to 0.35" statewide, with higher amounts possible around the Big Bend and within some storms. Temperatures will stay warm over the next five days, with highs in the upper 80s to mid-90s through the weekend and lows in the low to upper 70s through Sunday morning. Winds will gust near 20 mph through Friday.



ARIZONA

A stalled low-pressure trough off the West Coast is bringing cooler, drier air into the low deserts, keeping temperatures a few degrees below normal through Friday. Warming is expected over the weekend, with temperatures returning to near seasonal normals by Sunday. Highs will range from the upper 90s to 105°F through Friday, increasing to 105–110°F by Sunday afternoon. Morning lows will stay in the low to mid-70s throughout the period.

Grop Appdates

Tropical activity remains relatively calm in the Pacific basin however, similar to last week, we are watching a low-pressure system that will move across northern Florida into the Gulf early next week.Very warm temperatures are expected across the Mississippi Valley into the Northeast as a heat dome builds across the region.

Central and West-Central Mexico is forecast to receive less rain helping promote growth in the region. The heavy rain this season has helped with the drought in the area over the past few years. Northwestern Mexico (Sinaloa, Sonora, Chihuahua) remain in severe drought conditions currently. Overall lettuce and leaf supplies are expected to continue to improve in the better weather.

In the Coastal California growing regions, unseasonably cool temperatures will continue to lessen growth rates across the region as the heavy marine layer continues especially for fields closest to the coast. Temperatures the past few weeks have averaged 7-10 degrees below seasonal norms. Mold, mildew and soil disease are on the rise in the fields, however not a major concern currently. Of most concern for growers remains Diamondback moth infestation in the Cole crops across the valley. The larvae are very active and well camouflaged on the plants making it very difficult for growers and harvest personnel to find the embedded pests. Broccoli and especially brussels sprouts have been impacted by infestations in some fields. Brussels sprouts were already very limited due to seasonal transition (Mexico finishing early due to quality issues) and cooler temperatures limiting growth in the upcoming Salinas Valley region. Supplies are expected to remain tight for the next couple weeks at a minimum.

As always, weather patterns will be crucial to future supplies from the numerous growing regions.







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
