

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Large to Jumbo sizes remain limited, while Smalls and Standards are more available. Overall supply is tight, lifting the market. Cooler weather slows Peruvian growth, and Mexican regions are transitioning amid heat and rain. Asparagus supplies will stay tight for weeks.

Strawberries: Salinas and Watsonville are declining, while Santa Maria ramps up this week and Oxnard follows in late September. Strong demand is pushing the market higher.

Lettuce (Iceberg): Demand exceeds supply as schools start, keeping production tight this week. Value-added lettuce prices are up, with some misshapen heads and lightweights (34-38 lbs) reported.

Lettuce Leaf: With schools reopening, demand is up for green and red leaf lettuces and romaine hearts. Some tip and fringe burn is reported, but shippers are trimming affected areas. Smaller sizing has increased 30-count romaine packs. Markets are expected to stay strong this week.

Pineapple: Heavy storms in Costa Rica limit pineapple supplies. Crownless pineapples are in high demand. Tariffs rose 10-15%, causing substitutions, cancellations, and order changes.

Tomatoes: Roma tomatoes have light to moderate supply; Baja yields are lighter. Round tomatoes are light in the East, steady in the West. Grape tomatoes are tight in the East, steady from Baja and Central Mexico.

CROP UPDATES

As August progresses, Salinas Valley's fall transition is underway. Yields and quality are declining, with lighter weights in romaine and iceberg. Insect and disease pressure—like fusarium, thrips, and diamondback moth—is rising, affecting broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, and Brussels sprouts. Lettuce faces seeder, mildew, and insect damage. Iceberg prices remain high due to lower yields. Harvests in Huron and Yuma are upcoming, but Salinas remains the main area. Expect tighter supplies and active markets into September. Close supplier communication and fast planning are key.

WEATHER

California: High pressure brings above-average temps inland Wednesday; cooler near coast. Lows 50s-60s, highs 60s-102. Cooling starts Thursday, with milder weekend highs.

Mexico: Showers and storms continue through the weekend with light rain. Temps stay warm, highs 70s-80s, lows mid 50s to low 60s.

Florida: Isolated to scattered thunderstorms expected in Florida through Aug 17. Rain 0.05"-0.30". Warm, humid with highs 80s-90s and lows 70s. Winds 15-20 mph.

Arizona: Cooling, clouds, and humidity increase through Friday with monsoonal showers in central Arizona. Phoenix may see scattered storms; no rain expected west of Gila Bend.

The apple market is shifting from old crop to new. Fuji, Golden Delicious, Honeycrisp, Cosmic Crisp, and Pink Lady are approaching the end of their season, while supplies of Red Delicious, Granny Smith, and Gala are starting to dwindle. New crop Gala and Ginger Gold are now shipping, with Honeycrisp expected to begin within the next two weeks. Fresh Granny Smith, Red Delicious, Fuji, and Ambrosia will follow in September.

Avocados

Peak sizes are 48 and 60 count, with Flora Loca as the main crop since the old crop is nearly finished. Dry matter is in the mid-20s, compared to the low 30s of the older crop, meaning the new crop will take longer to ripen. Fruit is very clean, with minimal #2 grade fruit, typical for this season. California's season is slowing and expected to end in a few weeks. Offshore fruit is arriving on both coasts and should begin to wind down next month.

Citrus (Lemons)

Markets remain strong with District 2 (Ventura/Oxnard) as the only growing region. Sizes 165 count and smaller are very limited. Choice grade dominates due to growing conditions, with fair quality including softer fruit and early decay. Coastal winds and moisture contribute to these issues. Shippers are culling compromised fruit. Prices are higher than last summer due to strong demand and reduced imports. Offshore fruit is arriving lightly, and Mexican supplies are down year over year.

Fruit is peaking on medium sizes with low South Texas crossings. Colombian fruit is available in Florida with moderate quality. Markets are expected to stay active through September.

CALIFORNIA

Strong high pressure will bring above-average temperatures inland Wednesday, while a moderate marine layer keeps coastal temps near to slightly above average. Morning lows will range from the low 50s to low 60s. Daytime highs will reach the low to upper 60s along the coast, low to mid 80s in the coastal valleys, and 90s to 102 degrees south of Soledad. The high weakens Thursday, leading to a cooling trend away from the coast as the marine layer deepens through the weekend. Weekend highs will be in the mid 70s to low 80s in the coastal valleys and mid 80s to mid 90s south of Soledad.



MEXICO

Isolated showers and thunderstorms will continue through the weekend, with rainfall totals generally between 0.05" and 0.30," though higher amounts are possible in some storms. Temperatures will stay seasonably warm through August 17th, with highs ranging from the upper 70s to upper 80s on Wednesday, mid 70s to mid 80s from Thursday through Saturday, and low 70s to low 80s on Sunday. Lows will be in the mid 50s to low 60s through Sunday morning.



FLORIDA

Isolated to scattered afternoon and evening thunderstorms are expected across the Florida peninsula through August 17th. Rainfall totals will generally range from 0.05" to 0.30," with higher amounts possible in some storms. Temperatures will stay warm and humid, with highs in the upper 80s to mid 90s and lows in the low to upper 70s through Sunday morning. Peak wind speeds of 15 to 20 mph are anticipated through Friday and into the weekend.



ARIZONA

From today through Friday, expect some cooling with increasing clouds and humidity as monsoonal showers return to central Arizona. The Phoenix area may experience scattered showers and thunderstorms late tonight through Friday evening. No rain is expected west of Gila Bend.

Grop Undates

Late Season Pressure in Salinas Valley

As we move through the back half of August, the fall transition is beginning to take shape in the Salinas Valley. While volume has remained relatively steady, several factors are starting to chip away at yields and quality.

Lately, lighter weights have become more common, especially in romaine and iceberg boxes. Some shippers are diverting products into secondary labels due to appearance and sizing issues. Premium labels are still available, but substitutions are becoming more common across the industry.

Insect and disease pressure continues to build. Fusarium and sclerotinia are showing up in more fields, particularly in third-rotation ground. Meanwhile, the potential for Indian Summer warmth could push insect activity even higher. Thrips pressure is on the rise, and so is diamondback moth activity across cole crops in both Salinas and Santa Maria. These pests are especially difficult to manage at this time of year, and growers are limited in their treatment options due to residue restrictions and pesticide resistance.

When diamondback larvae hatch, they feed on leaves and stems, then pupate in hard-to-reach places like under broccoli crowns or between cauliflower florets. This makes them tough for both harvest crews and processors to spot and difficult for insecticides to control. Along with thrips and aphids, these pests are contributing to ongoing pressure across broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, and Brussels sprouts.

In lettuce, alongside lighter weights, crews are encountering seeder, mildew, internal burn, growth cracks, and insect damage, which varies from field to field. Iceberg markets dipped this past week, but with lower yields expected in upcoming lots, prices are projected to remain high through the end of the Salinas season. Looking ahead, Huron is expected to begin harvest in October, and bed prep is underway. Yuma plantings will begin in September, but it's too early to get a clear read on crop conditions. We'll know more once early stands are up and growing. Salinas will remain the main production area, but with variability in the fields, we'll need to focus on weight and quality. As insect and disease pressure increase, we expect yields to tighten and markets to become more active as September approaches. Staying close to your suppliers and planning for faster turns can help manage what's shaping up to be a dynamic finish to the season.
