

MARKET ALERTS

Brussel Sprouts: Remain very tight; Salinas and Oxnard face insects, decay, and small sizes.

Cantaloupe: Westside deal ends; Florida offshore fruit starting. Domestic cantaloupe prices high due to low yields, mainly 9s, with sizing and cosmetic issues.

Cauliflower: Supplies remain limited as Salinas season ends.

Celery: Heavy rain slows production; Salinas done, Yuma after Christmas. Value-added items priced higher; limited availability all sizes.

Grapes: Strengthening: green tight, some finished; reds available into mid-December. Peruvian imports arriving, volumes rising late Nov–early Dec.

Lettuce (iceberg): Yuma slightly better, Huron finishing; value-added lettuce prices remain high, with defects and 34–38 lb cartons.

Lettuce Tender Leaf: Supplies remain very tight from low yields; limited this week.

Pineapple: Costa Rica storms limit pineapples through early Nov; crownless in high demand. Prices rising, potential substitutions, cancellations, and port delays.

Strawberries: California needs 7–10 days to recover from heavy rain; Santa Maria likely done. Markets tight. Central Mexico increasing, Florida starting small volumes, Baja in ~2 weeks.

Tomatoes: East cooler with brief freeze; romas tight, rounds adequate. Central Mexico mainly via McAllen; eastern grapes tight. Active markets through next week.

ALERT

After four days of rain, with some areas receiving up to six inches, California will need several days to dry out and recover. Most shippers expect this process to take 7-10 days. Santa Maria is likely finished for the season following this weather event. Markets are currently in a demand-exceeds-supply situation.

Central Mexico is increasing production, but not quickly enough to offset the present shortage. Florida is just beginning to see very small pallet volumes, with more meaningful quantities expected after the Thanksgiving holiday. Baja is projected to begin production in about two weeks.

The grape market is expected to continue strengthening throughout the month. Domestic green varieties are tightening more quickly than reds, with some shippers already finished for the season. Others packing from storage anticipate having greens available through the last week of November. Most shippers project domestic red supplies will carry into the first half of December.

CALIFORNIA

Clouds increase Wednesday as a low-pressure system approaches. Morning lows will range from the mid-30s south of King City to upper 30s-low 50s near the coast, with daytime highs in the mid-50s to mid-60s. Light to moderate showers start overnight and continue through early Friday, totaling $\frac{1}{4}$ "- $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Skies clear Friday, with inland lows returning to the mid-30s and highs reaching upper 50s to low 70s over the weekend.



MEXICO

Warmer and mostly dry conditions expected, with only isolated light showers. Highs will range from mid-70s to mid-80s through Sunday, and lows from the upper 40s to upper 50s.



FLORIDA

Warm weather continues through Sunday, with highs in the upper 70s to mid-80s. Lows will range from the low 50s to near 60 in northern Florida, and upper 50s to upper 60s in central and southern Florida. Winds gust 15–20 mph through Nov 21 in Southeast Florida and Tampa Bay. Mostly dry, with only isolated sprinkles expected.



ARIZONA

The forecast is trending wetter this week with two passing cut-off low-pressure systems. Most Wednesday rain targets central Arizona, with isolated light showers possible in Yuma and Imperial Valleys through midday. Light rain lingers over central Arizona Thursday, with showers returning to southeast California by late Thursday and spreading across Arizona Friday, tapering off Saturday evening. Sunday should be dry across all valleys.

Highs cool to the low-mid 60s by Friday, warming to mid-60s-mid-70s by Sunday. Morning lows drop to mid-upper 40s Thursday, gradually warming to around 50 by Sunday.

Salinas season draws to a close this week with Yuma slated for 11/17 start. Expect Value Added suppliers to continue to fill the pipeline with product from the northern growing regions creating loading delays in Yuma. We are anticipating 48 hour dwell times in Yuma week of 11/17. Be prepared to wait for your product in Yuma. We are also expecting a very active truck market in Yuma this winter and are working on some creative ideas to circumvent the political setbacks affecting the truck market. Stay tuned for that or reach out to our team for more info for the time being.

Prop Updates

Rain Soaked Holiday Pressure

After weeks of talking transition, we've officially made it to Yuma. And while the weather seems to have followed us south, there's finally a sense of relief in the lettuce patch. Early desert romaine and leaf are coming in stronger and cleaner than the final Salinas lots. Yields are still light, and weights will take some time normalize, but this product has legs.

That's good news, because the Central Coast got absolutely soaked last week. Some areas picked up over 6 inches of rain, essentially ending Salinas and leaving Santa Maria and Oxnard berry growers digging out from waterlogged fields. Strawberry yields will remain low for the next three weeks. Oxnard is holding steady for now, but it's not enough to offset the sharp decline elsewhere. Fruit is soft with elevated bruising and mildew pressure. Supplies out of Central Mexico are picking up slowly but still running behind historical trends. Baja is still behind on production and Florida is starting to scratch the surface of their crop. Open market availability remains limited heading into Thanksgiving.

Oxnard is also the primary celery region this time of year, with transfers headed to Yuma. While celery tends to thrive with moisture, soaked fields are slowing harvest. Crews are doing what they can, but product is heavy and hard to move in the thick mud.

Brussels sprout supplies remain limited as the crop transitions south. Rain, rising demand, and the coastal-desert gap are keeping markets snug, especially on value-added packs. Quality has been fair.

Central Mexico supplies have helped stabilize multiple categories. Harvests and crossings remain seasonally light but are providing some relief in berries and wet veg.

And what would Thanksgiving be without Idaho potatoes? Quality is excellent and supplies are strong, but outbound transportation is a growing concern. Carrier capacity out of the Northwest remains tight, and high freight costs on low FOBs continue to slow movement.

The desert is up and running. Product is improving. And while we're still navigating a few bumps - weather, freight, and tight availability - we're headed in the right direction into the holidays.
