

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Mexican asparagus supplies remain tight due to weather, reduced crews, and border delays, while strong East Coast demand for Peruvian asparagus keeps markets active.

Brussel Sprouts: Supplies are very limited due to insect pressure, quality issues, and small sizing in Salinas Valley and Oxnard.

Citrus (Oranges): Navel oranges peak on 88/72/56ct; 113/138ct are tight. Fog and upcoming rain may cause harvest delays and quality issues.

Cucumber: Florida production is low, Honduran imports are light, and Nogales volumes are moderate but demand keeps prices high.

Grapes: The grape market is shifting to imports, with higher prices expected through the holidays; larger January volumes should ease FOBs.

Green Onion: Supplies are tight from recent rains, keeping the market elevated.

Pineapple: Pineapples are stabilizing but remain tight on 8/10-count crownless and organic, with possible substitutions and holiday port delays.

CROP UPDATES

Weather disruptions are returning ahead of Christmas, with rain affecting California, the desert, and parts of Mexico, creating short-term harvest and loading challenges. Despite this, desert lettuce quality is improving and broader supply conditions are expected to rebound after the holiday as fields dry, additional regions contribute volume, and demand softens. WEATHER

California: Wet, windy low Tuesday–Wednesday with SE gusts to 50 mph and ½"–1¼" rain; slow-moving system Wed–Sat brings 1½"–4" rain and similar winds.

Mexico: Mostly dry through the weekend; highs mid-60s-mid-70s, lows low 40s-low 50s.

Florida: Seasonal to slightly abovenormal temps with mostly dry weather; winds 18–25 mph Tue, ~20 mph Wed-Thu in SE Florida.

Arizona: Low west of SF Bay brings spotty rain Tue–Wed to SE California and Arizona, heavy showers Wed afternoon, tapering Thu–Fri.

FREIGHT

Freight this week sees increased demand for abbreviated loading to circumvent the Christmas holiday. With an anticipated bottleneck in Yuma growing region on 12/26 suggesting early bookings and expected loading delays

Apples

The 2025–2026 Washington apple season continues to take shape, with early projections proving more optimistic than current packing realities. Gala volumes in particular are coming in significantly lighter, with this year's crop running approximately 3 million cases below the same point last season. Pink Lady and Ambrosia are also down, each by about 1 million cases year over year. As a result, pricing on all three varieties is trending upward.

Avocados

Markets are holding steady at lower levels, supported by ample fruit on the trees and softer demand. Harvesting in Mexico will be minimal this week due to the holiday, so market response will depend on the reduced supply. Aventajada remains the primary crop currently being harvested and shipped, with peak sizes at 48ct and 60ct and dry matter/oil content in the high 20s to low 30s.

CALIFORNIA

A wet, windy low moves in Tuesday with light to moderate showers, increasing to moderate-heavy overnight, tapering early Wednesday. SE winds may gust up to 50 mph. Temps: mornings upper 30s-mid 50s, highs upper 50s-mid 60s. Rain totals: $\frac{1}{2}$ "- $\frac{1}{4}$ " by early Wednesday. A slow-moving system follows Wednesday through early Saturday with moderate-heavy rain, gusts up to 50 mph, and totals of $\frac{1}{2}$ "- $\frac{4}{4}$ ".



MEXICO

Mostly dry through the weekend with a few isolated showers. Highs mid-60s to mid-70s midweek; morning lows dropping to the low 40s-low 50s by the weekend.



FLORIDA

Temperatures will remain steady, seasonal to slightly above normal, through the weekend. Mostly dry weather is expected over the next five days, with winds gusting 18–25 mph Tuesday and around 20 mph Wednesday–Thursday across southeast Florida.



ARIZONA

A deepening low west of the SF Bay will bring southerly flow over southeast California and Arizona, causing spotty moisture Tuesday afternoon. Light rain is possible in Yuma County and west-central Arizona, spreading to Coachella Valley early Wednesday and into Imperial Valley by sunrise. Southeast California may see heavy showers and thunderstorms Wednesday afternoon, with Yuma getting a brief break until late Thursday. Rain coverage should steadily decrease Thursday evening in Arizona and remain spotty in southeast California Friday.

Grop Updates

Weather Returns as the Desert Crop Finds Its Stride

Weather is back in focus heading into Christmas week, and the timing is less than ideal. A series of rain events is forecast across coastal California, Baja, and parts of the Arizona desert, while cooler temperatures continue to linger in Mexico and Florida. None of these systems are extreme on their own, but with holiday schedules, lighter labor, and already tight supply chains, even modest weather can create outsized disruptions.

Santa Maria and Oxnard are expected to see several days of rain into the weekend. The desert is also on the radar, with scattered showers expected, particularly in Coachella, with lighter totals in Yuma. Muddy conditions will affect harvesting and loading, and rain-related issues such as mildew pressure, dirt in packs, and shortened shelf life may surface in both commodity and value-added items.

Despite that, iceberg, romaine, and green leaf quality continue to improve in the desert. Product coming out of Yuma is showing stronger structure and better shelf life, with weights steadily increasing. Rain may temporarily slow progress, but once fields dry out, availability should rebound quickly. Overall, the desert crop is setting up well.

Spring mix and baby leaf remain more sensitive. Arugula continues to be the tightest item, and moisture will create inconsistent yields. Newer lots are showing improved color and texture, but supplies remain snug with little excess available.

Strawberry production is still light in Santa Maria and Oxnard, and additional rain will further delay harvests and slow fruit maturity. Baja and Central Mexico are increasing crossings and helping balance the market, while Florida continues to produce steady volumes with gradual improvement expected into January. Softer demand is helping absorb some of the supply pressure without creating major volatility.

Oxnard remains the primary celery growing region this time of year. While celery tolerates moisture better than most crops, saturated soils make it difficult to move heavy product out of the fields. Expect intermittent harvest delays and uneven loading schedules until conditions improve.

Brussels sprouts remain extremely tight heading into the holiday and are expected to stay that way into January, particularly for value-added packs. Recent rain, prior heat stress, and insect pressure have compromised raw product integrity, limiting pack-outs and shortening shelf life. Even as demand eases after Christmas, supplies will remain constrained until additional southern production comes online.

While weather will create short-term challenges this week, the broader outlook is improving. Desert production is gaining strength, Mexico and Florida are contributing more volume, and demand typically softens between Christmas and New Year's. Once fields dry out, availability should ease and load times should improve as we close out the year. As we head into the holidays, it's worth recognizing that this industry runs on people. From the fields to the sheds to the trucks and offices, it's the commitment of those teams that keeps food moving under tough conditions. It's been a challenging season, and we're thankful for everyone who makes it work.
